Target People

• Sick persons seeking treatment at Bir Hospital (indoor and outdoor patients) who cannot afford prescribed medicines

• Caring for patients in the Burn Unit (dressing & skin grafting)

Changes in 1992 GNHA took over the management and full funding

Core activities

• Procurement of medicine as per essential drugs list, authorized by the Department of Drugs Administration of Nepal

• Keeping always sufficient level of stock

- Distribution of medicines & surgical goods according to the prescription of doctors
- Payment of clinical investigations
- Supply of food & supplements to needy patients and their caretakers
- Support to patients of other Government Hospitals with free medicine
- Managing the Poor Patient Fund for extraordinary treatment costs
